There are many hillocks in Araku and Paderu agency areas in Visakhapatnam district with an altitudes ranging from 900mts to 1200mts. Kimmidipattu, Gattum, Gunnamamidi, Galipadu, Jagamputtu villages of Hukumpeta Mandalam are... far away from development. Tribal people living in these areas practise terrace farming on the slope of the hills.





These villagers literally know nothing about electricity. Government erected some Electric poles which fell down by heavy winds. That is why dim kerosene lights are the only source of light during nights. Living in darkness these villagers also are deprived of safe drinking water. Natural springs are the only water source which are located at high altitudes. Women used to walk 2 to 3 kms up to fetch water from natural springs. Never any access to water supply and electricity and no one bothered about these scattered isolated villages. But Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Visakhapatnam came forward to serve these neglected Adivasis. They, along with their volunteers, surveyed and selected some such villages.

Water pipes were got laid by the ashrama to bring the spring water to the doorsteps of tribal villages. Mission protected them from diseases by conducting health camps. Blankets were supplied to protect themselves from severe cold. A path of light spread across these remote dark villages. "Rural Media" visited these areas and talked with tribal people about the difference made by the interventions of Ramakrishna mission Ashrama in their lives

RICH WATER SOURCE ON THE HILL

Galipadu, a tiny village situated at an altitude of 900mts from MSL where wind blows continuously and thus the name Galipadu (Gali means wind). Villagers harvesting the waters from hills practise terrace farming and cultivate paddy and millets. The same water is used for drinking and other household purposes..

That Day: There are around 150 families living in Galipadu village. Villagers used to walk more than a kilometre in the forest to fetch drinking water. Water was contaminated and muddy causing diseases. The situation used to be much worse during rainy season and especially for aged people.

Today: Realizing the difficulties of Galipadu village, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama came forward to help the village to overcome their problems. From the natural springs on the hilltops, pipeline of 300 mtrs was laid up to the village centre, and a water tank with a tap was provided. It is indeed a mission Bhagiratha by Ramakrishna Mission to bring water from the hilltop to the village. A water filter also is fixed at the spring to purify and make the water potable that tribal villagers are now drinking. Springs in those areas are perennial and don't get dried up. Following gravity principles pipes are laid. So without the usage of power villagers are getting 24hours water supply.

RESPONSE OF PEOPLE:

Diseases reduced

"Our village is 78kms away from Hukumpet mandal center. We never had a supply of potable water. Government officials never come to our places. We cannot reach main road from our village unless we walk 3kms in the path across the forest. Not only we didn't have water, we didn't have electricity or roads either. In January, 2015, volunteers of Ramakrishna Mission stepped into our village. They fixed pipes from hilltop water spring and provided 24 hours of water supply. We were prone to diseases by drinking unclean water, but today circumstances changed. We are getting pure water for our use. Everybody is healthy. If anybody provides pipe connection to two more streets, it will be comfortable for ladies."

Natural water springs are boon to tribal people. Springs are life saving water sources for Adivasis of Visakhapatnam. They are perennial and generally don't dry up and flow continuously. Water is used for cultivation as well drinking purposes.



"We never dreamt of it!" We used to bring water during rainy season walking up the hills with much difficulty. This went on for ages together. Now Ramakrishna Mission brought waters to our doorsteps. Valves are also arranged to stop wastage of water. Getting water 24 hours, we are going to field work without any worry about fetching drinking water.

Life giving water in every house!

"Our village was neglected and uncared for all these years, but Ramakrishna Mission changed our lives by providing safe drinking water. For generations together we suffered from water borne diseases. Many could not go to work due to these diseases – no wages, no food. Children used to drop out from the school with diarrhoea etc. Now there is no such problem. Women need not go out in search of water. We are getting 24 hours water supply enabling us to attend to other works. Ramakrishna Mission protected us from water problem. But there is no road to the village. Even pregnant women have to walk for 3 kms to reach hospital. Government should save us from this problem."

DRINKING WATER FOR EACH HOME

Jangam Puttu is about 79 kms from Hukumpeta Mandal centre with 120 families. They had to walk 2kms to reach main road through forest – no electricity, no drinking water. They used to struggle to get water for their daily usage.

Then: Tribal women had to walk up hill 1.5kms to fetch water from the springs. There is spring near the village but the availability of water is less, and contaminated causing diseases like typhoid etc. . Children used to drop out from the schools. Adults were foregoing daily labour as, they had to be absent from their daily work just to get drinking water.

Today: Understanding the plight of the Jangamputtu villagers Ramakrishna Mission came forward. Water from the springs were brought down to the villages by laying pipelines for a length of 2kms. Now the problem of bringing water from far off distance solved. Every family is provided with purified water and are relieved from health problems.

RESPONSE OF TRIBAL PEOPLE:

Water at door step

“During Hudhud cyclone everybody received help. But no one visited our remote village. Nobody came to our rescue. It is Ramakrishna Mission which supported us by giving blankets and solar lights. After listening to our problems Mission has laid pipelines from the springs to our village. They helped us a lot. From day one of the connection there are no problems in the supply of water. The entire family is drinking safe water.”

ROAD CONNECTIVITY IS NEEDED:

“We have to walk 3 kms to reach main road from our villages through forest. At times we even have to carry pregnant women to the hospital through the same pathways. It takes hours to reach hospital, even then we are not sure whether they survive or not. If ITDA authorities construct roads, it would save our lives.”

WATER FROM DISTANT HILL SPRINGS REACHED THE VILLAGE

PURE WATER AT DOOR STEP:

“From dawn to dusk we had to climb the hills for water. During rainy season we used to face much more trouble. We had to even carry babies on one hand and water vessels on the other. Same practice continued for generations. Then the Ramakrishna Mission came and it was a great help to us. Steps were taken by them to bring water in the middle of the village by fixing pipelines and taps. Now water is available for cooking and other household usage. No water is wasted now. Previously we used to drink muddy water only filtered with cloth for drinking and as a result we were prone to diseases. Today we got the opportunity to drink filtered water. Thanks to Ramakrishna Mission.”

“Our village children who are in the city hostels in Visakhapatnam for studies were afraid of coming back home during vacation, reason being lack of drinking water, lights and roads. After receiving solar lights and drinking water from Ramakrishna Mission our children also are coming back home.”

WASTED SPRING WATERS QUENCH THE THIRST OF VILLAGES

Water is one of the five elements of world (Panchabhutas). By harvesting spring waters for irrigation tribal people eked out their livelihoods. Perennial springs cover the villages with green blankets. These people live in nature and protect the natural resources.

Natural pure water:

Ramakrishna Mission did not simply laid pipelines to the village but also took necessary steps to supply the filtered water. To filter the water in a scientific manner they arranged water filter and water tanks on a cement base. After filtering the water for three times, water is supplied to the villages. Tribal people are trained in the usage of filter and to stop the leakage in the pipelines. Local people now undertake repair works, if any, and get drinking water without any wastage.

Walk miles together for water:

“Previously one had to walk for nearly 2kms. uphill for water. Old people and pregnant ladies faced so many problems due to this. Ramakrishna Mission brought water to our village from faraway hills. They solved the age old problems. Now we drink safe drinking water and our health is better”

Natural spring at Hilltop:

“Natural water springs from slope of the hills. Nobody knows the origin of these springs. They flow continuously in summer season or in rainy season. These waters are protecting us. We believe that the water has medicinal values also.”

Small solar lights light up the hills



Crores of people all over the world are deprived of lights in the night. They are forced to live in the darkness.

Among them are the tribal people of Visakha agency. They have no knowledge about what the electricity is. Ramakrishna Mission stepped into these remote Adivasi villages to relieve them from darkness with solar lights. If we want to see light rays of change we have to go to the villages of Hukumpeta mandal.



Kummidiputtu is located 70 kms away from the Mandal Headquarters. Total population is 247. Electric poles are standing in the villages only for name's sake. Power cut occurs even due to a little breeze, and therefore the local people forgot about electricity and depend completely on kerosene lights. Sometimes even kerosene also gets out of stock in ration shops. Sometimes they don't have enough money to buy kerosene. So practically villagers in these areas live in darkness only.

IN THIS BACKDROP Volunteers of Ramakrishna Mission visited these villages. To bring light to these villagers forced to live in darkness, Ramakrishna Mission distributed solar lights to 47 houses. Let us see the reaction of the villagers when the rays of light illuminate the gloom of the darkness after dusk.

PROTECTING FROM SNAKES AND OTHER POISONOUS CREATURES :

"After day's hard work, when darkness spreads, our problem starts. Poisonous nocturnal creatures like scorpions and sometimes even snakes are seen in our homes. Sometimes we get no sleep in the night due to the fear of these. Our children could not study. It was not possible even for adults to go out of the house in the pitch dark night.. Under such circumstances Ramakrishna Mission distributed solar lights and thus did very good to us. It is now easier to go out in the street in the night. With the solar light it is also good for our children's study in the night."

WANT STREET LIGHTS TOO:

"Sometimes fire accidents occur due to kerosene, but there is no such problem with solar lights. Our children study at night. It is useful while cooking in the night. If we get solar street lights also we will be grateful to them."

“Walk 10kms for cell phone charging

We had to walk 10 to 15kms and spend Rs.5 for charging our cell phones. There is no such problem now as the solar light has cell charging facility. Cell phones are continuously ringing in our village and we have the opportunity to talk and know about welfare of children studying in Visakhapatnam city.”

GREAT USE OF SOLAR LIGHT

“ By giving solar lights Ramakrishna Mission has done great help to us. They provide light during nights. They have facilities to charge our cell phones. If we have at least three such solar lights it will be convenient for the children to study and go out in the nights. We can even buy lights if we get loans from the banks.”

LIVELIHOOD WITH SOLAR LIGHTS

Ramakrishna Mission did not stop their work by simply distributing solar lights. Ten of us were trained to undertake repair work of lights in case of any damage. In six lights in our village the circuit board and the LED board were damaged. I am running a repairing shop, after getting trained from the Mission, to repair the solar lights. At least 10 to 15 people in a month come for repair. So I got a livelihood.”

SOLAR POWER- FREEDOM FROM DARKNESS:

Situated at a distance of 71 kms from the Mandal Headquarters this village has electric poles at high altitude where winds are common, and as a result there is frequent interruption of electricity. Therefore the villagers depend completely on kerosene lamps. Every house needs at least four litres of kerosene oil per month. Ramakrishna Mission distributed solar lights to 55 houses.

Expenses on Kerosen reduced: "The problem of going a long distance to get kerosene is solved now. We had to spend Rs.60/- per month on kerosene. That expenditure is saved now and we can feed our children with porridge. Also during nights children are able to study. These lights are really very much helpful to us. It is a great help from Ramakrishna mission."

Solar is the source of Light at Home



Pollution reduced:

“Not knowing the availability of Kerosene we had to go round the ration shops foregoing our daily work. Sometimes our eyes developed burning sensation due to kerosene smoke. Now every home has solar light. We are all happy. One year guaranty is given for all the lights. Even after one year lights are working perfectly. We need more such lights. Street lights are also necessary and to meet this end authorities should help us.”

“We realised the value of light after receiving solar lights. We are able to go to the farms even in the night. Studies for children, cooking work for families became very easy now. Those lights changed our life style. Our village is in between hills nearer to forest. If solar street light comes we get protection from wild animals. There is also no road connectivity from Galipadu village to our village. If Government can solve this problem we tribal people will be grateful”

NEED MORE LIGHTS

“We are all happy and grateful to Ramakrishna Mission which came to our village ,understood our problems and gave us solar lights. No other agency did this job. We are all happy. We did not have any regular contacts with outside world previously. Our cell phones are working now and we can communicate with others. But these lights are not enough for a family. We require minimum number of four such lights for each family. We will buy them if bank loans are arranged. Whom shall we discuss our problems with? We hope authorities will know our problems and solve.”

‘Solar lights were distributed and later training in repairing of lights also was given to some youngsters at Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama. No major problems are seen so far. I am attending to small problem, if any. I maintain a stall in the local market to explain how solar lights work. I am also teaching them how to repair the lights by themselves.’

Hunting crabs with solar lights

“We knew nothing about electricity. Ramakrishna Mission literally enlightened us by giving us solar lights. Because of solar lights our children are able to do home work. Our cooking problem also is solved. Crabs come out of their holes during night times. They move on the bunds. We are able to catch the crabs with the help of solar lights, and whole family is able to fill the stomach. That is how solar lights are relieving us from hunger.”

KEROSENE PROBLEMS SOLVED:

“We had incidents of fire accidents due to kerosene lamps. Kerosene lamps are also put out by the wind. Now we face no such problems due to the solar lights. Solar lights are very useful for the ladies to attend to the nature’s call during nights. Cooking became much easier in the presence of solar lights.”

WANT MORE LIGHTS:

At present Ramakrishna Mission has distributed one solar light for each family. We came to know the importance of light after this. We will be protected if such lights are installed in the streets also. These street lights not only will protect us from wild animals but also we can conduct important village meetings comfortably.





Ray of light for the tribal villages

In the wake of the sever cyclone Hudhud that hit Visakhapatnam (October 2014). 60% of trees and buildings were damaged even in the Ashrama and all over the city and surrounding areas. Many people came forward with assistance to affected people, but most of it was in the city areas! Ashrama immediately responded and arranged for drinking water in the city localities. Along with that in distant villages food and other article packets were distributed to 3500 families. After these, in the distant tribal villages after survey by our volunteers, in 254 villages, where there is no electric supply at all, 8300 solar lights were distributed. There after selecting 10 interior villages among them, where there was no water supply, a project was taken up to provide potable water. They had to walk long distances, to fetch water from natural springs. We arranged HDP pipes and reached the water at the door steps in those villages. An amount of Rs.1.40 crore was spent on all these above services

For water supply project 10000 Metres of 2” HDP pipes were procured. Engineer and technical personnel from Ranchi executed the work along with training the local youth in repair and maintenance. The spring water from the hills were brought to the villages by pipes and syntax tank and taps were fixed. For ensuring purity of water, multi layer filters were fitted. Now, villagers are getting safe water for 24 hours at their villages itself.


For those villages where there is no idea of what electric supply means, bringing light to them was an immediate need. 254 villages of Visakhapatnam, East Godavari, Vijayanagaram and Srikakulam districts were selected and 8300 solar lights were distributed. The Thrive Solar Energy Ltd, assisted us by providing Solar lights that are priced at 1800/- for Rs.1200/- only. Initially 2000 lights were distributed and later seeing the huge need and demand another 6300 lights were distributed. These LED lights can give bright light for 8 hours and also they can charge

the cell phones. This facility helped the villages to get connected with outside world

These lights are much brighter than the kerosene lamps. To attend to the minor repairs, 10 youth from these very villages were selected and training was imparted. These days, these youth are extending their services in the village weekly markets. Thus serving the people and also earning their livelihood.

Solar lights have brought new energy and hope for the villages motivating them for further development. These two important missions of providing safe drinking water and solar lights were accomplished by the Ashrama with the help of donations from generous people and agencies. I take this opportunity to thank everyone of them for their generosity. May the holy trinity bless them.

CASE STUDY

Villages in Visakha agency area are scattered and isolated. Natural springs on the hilltops are the only sources of water. In the absence of such springs villagers depend on muddy well water. Villagers practise terrace farming because the lands are on the slope. In these farms on the slopes they cultivate rice, ground nuts, cabbages etc. Social welfare programmes undertaken by Central and State Government normally do not reach these villagers. kerosene lamps are the only source of light after dusk. Even if electric poles are erected in some places they get electricity once in a blue moon. Located at the higher altitudes there is possibility of having strong winds due to which electric wires fall down, and there is no lineman available to repair these disruptions. But suddenly solar rays entered these neglected villages.

RURAL MEDIA went to Kimmidiputtu, Gattum, Gunnamamidi, Galipadu, Jangamputtu villages which are situated between Araku and Paderu, belong to Hukumpeta mandal of Visakha Agency. Rural Media observed the way Ramakrishna Mission is coming forward to help the Tribal people by providing drinking waters and solar lights. Rural media interviewed people of five Adivasi villages. Ramakrishna Mission has brought about a tremendous change in their life style by giving water and solar lights. This case study is a visualized translation of their present mode of life. Ramakrishna Mission started with a small step in some villages. Government should come forward to take up similar initiatives to all such remote villages/hamlets.

Still so many Adivasi villages without water, electricity and roads are waiting for the help from ITDA. The number of unemployed youth is surging like a silver oak under strong gale. If all the youth is trained to be efficient human resources with full fledged tribal development programme, the future generation will form Navyandhra.

BASIC STEPS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF ADIVASIS



RAMAKRISHNA MISSION -first step for the development of tribals

THAT DAY

1. One had to walk at least 3 kms uphill to fetch water
2. Those who couldn't go up drink muddy open well water and face health problems.
3. Elderly people, pregnant women faced problem while getting water from far off places.
4. In spite of having natural water spring, tribal people did not have scope to store water.

TODAY

1. Pipelines are laid down from the natural springs. Women need not to carry water
2. Tanks and water filters are built by Ramakrishna Mission. People drink protected water.
3. Incidence of diseases like diarrhoea, typhoid, jaundice are reduced.
4. Valves are arranged to stop the wastage.
5. Water is stored in the tanks.
6. Spring water is available throughout the year.
7. Hardship of the Tribal women to climb up hills for water stopped

Safe water at doorsteps. Solar lights at every house. Tribal children looking forward for tomorrow's future.



CASE STUDY

SOLAR LIGHTS LIGHT UP TRIBAL LIVES

PAST

1. Situated at an altitude of 1200 mts , in Galipadu village, frequent power failures
2. No facility for charging their cell phone. To get their phone recharged they have to walk for long distance and pay Rs.5/-.
3. Hill folks were afraid of wild animals and snakes in darkness.
4. Students couldn't do homework. If asked answer is "No light". Even though there is electric connection there won't be any supply. So they have to depend on kerosene lamps
5. No radio, no TV, cell phone is of no use when its battery is discharged. So they are devoid of any information from the outside world.
6. So many problems with kerosene lamps. Occurrences of fire accidents due to kerosene lamp are high.
7. If fire accidents occurred in such places where there are no roads, help from outside becomes impossible. So loss of lives and property is more.
8. When compared with electricity the expenditure due to kerosene lamps also is higher. The light produced by the kerosene lamp is less while the carbon dioxide released in the air is more.

PRESENT

1. Development started when Ramakrishna Mission distributed solar lights in these remote villages. Two important usage of these solar lights. A. Light to home, B. Charging the cell phone.
2. Expenditure due to kerosene reduced
3. Air pollution due to kerosene lamp reduced.
4. Due to light in the nights, fear from wild animals and other poisonous creatures reduced.
5. Students are getting good marks because they are able to do their homework in solar light.
6. Working hours and efficiency of people has improved.

Darkness is an unimaginable social problem. If the villagers' hard earned money is spent on kerosene how can they thrive? They had to walk far off places to buy and carry kerosene oil on their heads. Under such circumstances a ray of light in the form of solar lights distributed by Ramakrishna Mission, has lighted up their huts. During dark hours, solar lights are very helpful to cook in the hut, to sell the vegetables in the market children's study and to conduct village meeting and satsang, Solar lights have for too many uses. These solar lights which light for several hours have changed their life patterns. If few more steps are taken the development will be faster.

Solar lights changed their life patterns.
